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TASK 2

What ever happened to.....

When decimal currency was introduced in 1966, a 1 cent coin, 2 cent coin, 5 cent coin, 10 cent coin, 20 cent coin and round 50 cent coin were issued along with a \$1, \$2, \$10 and \$20 note.



In 1967 and 1968 there were no 50 cent coins minted but on its return in 1969 its shape had changed to a dodecagon to remove confusion with the similar sized 20 cent coin.



In 1990 the Australian Government announced the withdrawal of the 1 and 2 cent coins because of a decline in their worth. They had become more expensive to produce and distribute than the actual value of each coin.





In 1966, a one dollar and two dollar note were issued but they were replaced by coins to help reduce costs of maintaining the paper notes in a sound condition.

The \$1 coin was first circulated in 1984 And the \$2 coin in 1988.

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TASK 4

Designing coins and notes

Unfortunately, money doesn't grow on trees and therefore has to be made. The Reserve bank of Australia has all Australian notes printed by Note Printing Australia and coins are produced by the Royal Australian Mint.

You have been asked to design a new \$5 coin as well as a \$500 note. Consider these elements when making your design.

- The obverse (head) of the coin must portray the effigy of Queen Elizabeth II, the word Australia as well as 2016.
- The reverse side of the coin should consist of an Australian motif (not already in use) and a numeral indicating the value of the coin.
- The size of the coin or note.
- The colour of the coin or note.
- The note must display a famous Australian or famous Australian landmark.
- The note must have the word Australia shown clearly.
- The note must have the numerals and words indicating the value of it.
