FACTS ABOUT THE VENUES: identify which venue each of these facts relates to.

- After the Games, it will be transformed into a facility for locals as well as elite swimmers. Two of the wings will be removed leaving a maximum capacity of 3,500.
- It was an existing venue and is an exhibitions and conference centre rivaling Earls Court for being the best exhibition centre in London.
- This existing venue is an enclosed royal park. After the Games the temporary structures will be taken down and the park will return to the way it was.
- The venue is new, however the area has a long history, hosting the Queen's official birthday celebration each year with the Trooping of the Colour.
- This is the largest of London's Royal Parks and has been open to the public since 1637. The seating is a new but temporary addition to the park.
