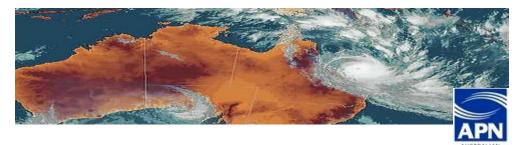

## A CYCLONE SAFETY CHECKLIST

Preparation and safety are very important before during and after a cyclone hits. Josh and Joanne helped to make sure jobs were done. Use the information in chapter six to make a list of the things that were on their Cyclone Safety Checklist.









### NAMING CYCLONES

To name new tropical cyclones, the Bureau of Meteorology Tropical Cyclone Warning Centres select a name from a list. They follow a cyclone naming policy which states:-.

- Tropical cyclone names in each list alternate male and female
- Names of cyclones that have already significantly affected the Australian region cannot be used again
- The names are normally chosen in sequence
- If two or more cyclones are occurring simultaneously, similar sounding names (eg June & Jane) are avoided to minimise confusion
- Names should not be capable of being construed to subject the Bureau to criticism or ridicule (eg naming a sequence of cyclones after politicians)
- Lists of names are coordinated with neighbouring meteorological services to avoid duplication

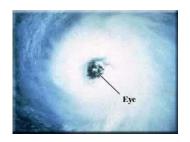

#### **WARNING**

During the Cyclone, Josh, Joanne and the others listened to the radio for Tropical Cyclone Advice. Whenever a tropical cyclone is expected to cause winds in excess of 62 km/h (gale force) over land in Australia, Tropical Cyclone Advices are issued.

Use this information to write a Cyclone Warning.

- The area covered by a cyclone watch and area covered by a cyclone warning
- The cyclone name
- The intensity of the cyclone (1 weak to 5 strong)
- The latest observed location of the cyclone centre
- The central pressure of the cyclone (warning only)
- The distance of the cyclone to significant locations
- The expected or recent movement of the cyclone
- Range of destructive winds
- Maximum wind gusts
- Advisory statements on actions to be taken to mitigate the effects of the cyclone
- The issue time for the next warning









### **LISTEN UP**

Fortunately those who live in cyclne prone areas are given information about the weather event before, during and after it hits.

All Clear, Cyclone Notice, Cyclone Warning, Cyclone Watch Cyclone Warning – Red Alert

- Cyclone is expected to affect the local area within 24 hrs.
  Residents should complete preparations and be ready to seek shelter.
- The immediate threat of the cyclone has passed. Residents are advised to beware of fallen power lines, flooded waterways and debris.
- No immediate threat, however potential for a cyclone to affect the local area within 5 days. Residents are advised to take precautions.
- Cyclone is expected to affect the local area within 48hrs. Residents should begin / continue necessary preparations.
- Cyclone imminent. Residents are advised to seek shelter immediately.

#### TRACKING A CYCLONE

Keeping a track on the movement of a cyclone can be very useful. Use the description of Cyclone Uriah's path and plot it on the map below.

Severe Tropical Cyclone Uriah had started its life as a tropical low in the Coral Sea (14°S 153°E) on 4 January but the system, named by the Australian Bureau of Meteorology on 5 January, quickly intensified to a category two cyclone and started tracking in a general westward direction (14.5°S 151°E). It rapidly intensified to a Category 3. For the next 24 hours – 6 January - Uriah maintained Category 3 intensity ((16°S 150°E) before being upgraded to a Category 4 on 7 January. During this time, the cyclone started to take a more west-southwestward direction (16.8°S 149.6°E) and began to accelerate towards the tropical Queensland coast, showing signs of further intensification. Cyclone Uriah maintained its south-west movement and on 8 January had tracked to 17.6°S 149°E maintaining its Category 4 status. As it approached the coast it intensified to a Category 5 sitting 19°S 147.5°E. It crossed the coast between Townsville and Ayr on 9 January (19.2°S 147.2°E) as a Category 5.

When plotting the co-ordinates on the map use the cyclone symbol and write the category number in the middle. Next to it write the date.

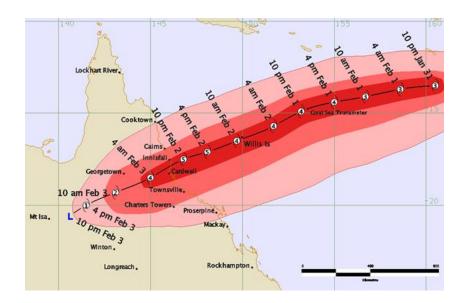

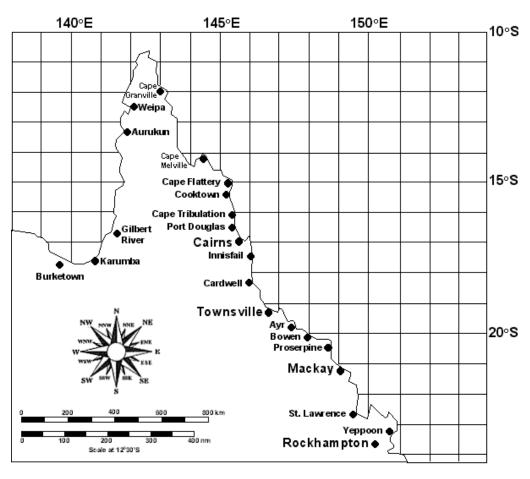
